MoA Approved by the AFA Membership!

Yes, we have approved the MOA (Memorandum of Agreement) that we, the AFA, negotiated with NCC over a six and one-half month period that ended on January 14, 2019. An MOA consists of the changes in the current contract – additions, subtractions, and modifications that are infused into the current contract to form the new contract. At our General Membership Meeting on Saturday, May 11th, our Negotiating Team consisting of Rose Tavitian, Scott Stark, Garry Ouellette, Richard Erben and I presented the various stipulations in the MOA to the membership for clarification, questions, and discussion as needed. The meeting lasted a bit over two hours. Just before the meeting was adjoined, the membership gave the team a heartfelt standing ovation that touched each of us. The following day, Richard Erben and Rose Tavitian put in motion the process that we used to bring the MOA vote to our membership. Two emails went out to members informing them that the actual vote would take place electronically via Electionbuddy starting at 7:00 am Tuesday morning and ending at 6 pm on Friday evening. Five years ago, we opted to go to electronic elections so that every AFA member would be able to have say in their union. We understand that many are not able to attend a ratification meeting but their voice is equally important. Therefore, we pioneered electronic voting on campus. Along with the MOA, each member received instructions as to how they could access the current contract via our website at http://myafaonline.org if desired. The MOA was overwhelmingly approved by a vote of 592 (93.45%) "Yes," to 42 (6.6%) "No."

I would be remiss if I did not note that negotiations between our negotiating team and the college's team were collegial and professional throughout. On a few occasions we found that we were "stuck in mud"; our point of view and that of the college were 180 degrees apart. Because both sides were cognizant of each other's needs and requirements and listened to each other's rationale, we were able to resolve the divide.

Moving forward, the MOA still must be approved by the Nassau County Executive, the Nassau Community College Board of Trustees and the Nassau County Legislature. Currently, the MOA is in the hands of the Nassau County Executive, as it has been for the last three plus months. Once signed by the County Executive the MOA will move to the NCC BOT and then to the Nassau County Legislature. We are hopeful that approval process will be completed in a timely manner.

From the President's Desk

On Thursday April 25th, the Accounting and Business Administration Department presented their "Business Day in America" program in CCB 252/253. The program began at 8:30 AM with AFA President Stefan Krompier and NCCFT President Frank Frisenda speaking to the topic "Unions in America."

President Frisenda began the presentation by positing a series of multiple choice questions that tested the students' knowledge of unions such as: What is collective bargaining?, What is the best definition of Right to Work?, Why did labor unions arise in America?,

and What is true or false concerning work rule standards? This interactive approach was welcomed by the students with many of them becoming involved in the discourse early on.

Both President Frisenda and President Krompier helped the attendees understand that

unions reward their members with higher pay, better working conditions, and a grievance process that enables members to have recourse when their legal and/or contractual rights have been violated. Also emphasized was the notion that state laws known as Right to Work Laws are ill named. Evidence clearly dem-

onstrates that the appropriate name should be Right to Work for Less Laws. President Krompier ended the program with an explanation of the effect of the United States Supreme Court's Decision in the Janus Case coupled with New York State Law in fact leaves those who choose to not join unions such as ours without representation when charges such as sexual harassment are brought against them. He stated that he is happy when he can turn down a non-member's – often characterized as free riders or free loaders - request for representation.

Professors Tauton, Gray, Mandel and Gordon followed at 10 AM presenting "Skills to be Successful in Business" and Professors Emin and Gray at 1 PM presenting "Should Business Taxes be Raised or Lowered?"


The Inside Scoop



Lake-Sumter Adjunct Professors Vote to Unionize

LEESBURG — Adjunct faculty at Lake-Sumter State College voted to form a union Tuesday, joining the Service Employees International Union Faculty Forward, which represents adjunct faculty at multiple universities and colleges.

The move follows the unionization of the school's full-time faculty in October and comes in response to what organizers believe is a wage gap between Lake-Sumter adjuncts and their counterparts in other Florida colleges.

"Today we have taken an important step towards achieving fairness at Lake-Sumter State College," said Joseph Silver, adjunct biology professor at the school. "Adjuncts teach the majority of classes at Lake-Sumter, yet many of us can't cover the basics. It's time for us to come together and ensure that adjunct faculty can earn a living while providing students a great education."

According to a report cited by the organizing faculty, Florida Colleges in Crisis, most adjunct professors in Florida earn around \$1,900 per class they teach, or just \$17,000 per year. Lake-Sumter adjuncts make even less, they said.

Debby Hicks, one of the faculty leaders behind Lake-Sumter's full-time faculty union, supported the adjunct faculty in their decision.

"We congratulate our adjunct colleagues for winning their union election and look forward to working together to make Lake-Sumter a better institution for our wonderful students," she said.
"All faculty members, whether adjuncts or full-time, deserve to have direct representation to address the issues that matter most: making sure our students get the best education possible."

Lake-Sumter responded to the union vote late Tuesday: "LSSC has made significant progress over the last two years improving our student learning experience through innovation and collaboration," LSSC spokesman Kevin Yurasek wrote in an email. "The College will continue to follow the processes as outlined by the Florida Public Employees Relations Commission."

Lake-Sumter's adjunct faculty join seven others in the state of Florida to join SEIU Faculty Forward, alongside Hillsborough Community College, Broward College, University of South Florida, Seminole State College and Miami Dade College.
